Roos Parish Council

Only four members attended the meeting on 9th July. Apologies for absence had been received from Councillors Bowden, Cook, Grant, Helliwell, & Quarmby.

Correspondence

Highways Department. Conditions for placing seasonal decorations on/above the highway.

Survey of Volunteers (via Community Council of Humberside). A questionnaire, part of a nation-wide survey, had been received.

Lamb Lane. The Parish Council had asked Technical Services whether the promised major upgrading of the main road would extend to Pinfold Lane, Hodgson Lane, and Lamb Lane. The Area Surveyor had replied that funds had been made available for work in Lamb Lane during the current financial year. Once design work had been done a scheme would be put to competitive tender. There were no present proposals for Pinfold Lane and Hodgson Lane but necessary repair work would be carried out on such roads.

Low-Cost Housing. Mr R.Cromie of James Robert Development Ltd had written accusing "the Parish" of being inconsistent. "The Rooster" had often reported discussions about the possible need for starter-homes in Roos yet when his firm offered such housing the Parish Council opposed it. As a result, said Mr Cromie, "we are scrapping all plans and shall put our investment and employment where it is wanted."

Operation Lifestyle

Community Work by Youngsters

During the summer holidays four groups of young people will be working to benefit our village as part of "Operation Lifestyle".

This is a scheme organised by Humberside Police with sponsorship from BP and the County Council. The aim is to tap the enterprise and altruism of youngsters by challenging them to undertake projects of value to local communities.

Each team must be registered with the Police and have a named adult responsible for general oversight. The teams must also keep a record of their work in the form of a scrapbook. In September the scrapbooks

will be entered in a competition for all projects completed. There will be some exciting prizes, including adventure holidays at home and abroad and a quite magnificent first prize - a two-week trip to California for the lucky winners.

One team will be helping and promoting existing functions held in the Memorial Institute. Led by Anne Broom, the team also consists of Victoria Beal, Claire Mitchell, Vicky Morgan (of Aldbrough), and Francesca Rannard. They aim to make posters to publicise the Wednesday Club and help by serving tea and coffee. They will also be serving refreshments for the Monday whist drives and Thursday Bingo sessions.

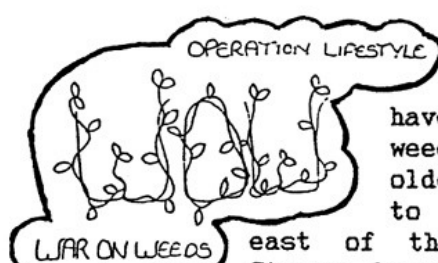
Two Churchyard Projects

1. The Lower Churchyard

Working on alternate days, a team of five boys aim to clear the badly-overgrown churchyard from the Rectory Road gate to the church steps. Friends at Withernsea High School, the lads are : Richard Tether (leader, Garton); Gavin Saunders (Burton Pidsea); Stewart Houghton (Holmpton); and Simon Dixon and Mark Wilson (Withernsea). Because none of them lives in Roos, they

have a longish cycle ride to the site. So far, using shears, sickles, fork and rake, they have made a positive start. They have been encouraged by the approval of local people, some of whom have brought refreshments and made cash donations - since another task they intend to tackle is the painting of the iron railings.

2. The Old Graveyard



Led by Stacey Sedgwick, a team of girls have begun clearing weeds from the older burial ground to the south and east of the church. Only Stacey herself and Helen Cook live in Roos. Like the boys, the other members of the team have a journey to make before they begin work : Claire Blakey (Burton Pidsea) and Helen Maritt and Jodie Megson (Withernsea).

Initial help in this formidable task was afforded by professional power tools hired at £10 a day and operated by Pete Sedgwick and Ron Wingham. The girls merely cleared the debris - 200 dustbin bags so far! Later they will use shears to clear around the individual graves. They expect to continue their labours for at least three days each week throughout the holiday period.

Like the boys, they have been encouraged both by the warm approval of passers-by and by the refreshments and donations received. Aware that they would incur expense, the girls have placed jars for donations in The Roos Arms and Mr Hinch's shop.

All four of these teams deserve our support since what the youngsters are taking on is for the general good of our community. On initial evidence, public support will not be lacking.
