Whilst there will be much routine business ahead, experience suggests that, when it is least expected, something will happen that will present it with a real challenge.

East Riding Councillor

Jackie Cracknell



This must be the first time that a member of our parish has been elected to serve on East Riding County Council since its formation in 1996.

Jackie is well known throughout the area having lived in Holderness for over 22 years. She moved and settled in Hilston 11 years ago. She serves as

Churchwarden at St Margaret's Parish Church and remains an active member of the Hilston and Tunstall Residents Association which mounted a robust and ultimately successful defence at the recent Monkwith Windfarm Public Inquiry.

However, some things are not so well known. She was born in Hertfordshire, and spent most of her formative and working life based in and around London. During early education she obtained Certificates and Diplomas in Management Studies and, later, a City & Guilds qualification as a Science Laboratory Technician. In 1979, she joined the British Transport Police and her career in the Police Service started, serving in uniform, C.I.D and later, into specialist secondments within the Metropolitan Police Service.

She attained the rank of Detective Chief Inspector, and of Acting Superintendent, in which she managed a number of departments becoming responsible for over 150 police and civilian personnel. Her operational duties ranged throughout the United Kingdom and Ireland but also to France, Belgium and China. Her experience has covered most, if not all, major criminal offences,

from disasters to drugs to terrorism.

Unfortunately, during investigations into aspects of the Potters Bar train disaster, she sustained an injury which resulted in her premature retirement from the Police Service.

This enabled her to devote more time to work within the local community and in 2006 became a member of the Roos Parish Plan group and a year later was elected to Roos Parish Council.

Her police training and experience in, emergency, response and contingency planning, were tested to the full during the flooding events of 2007. She subsequently led the development and production of an Emergency Plan which was later adopted by the ERYC as an example of best practice. It is now used throughout the area.

In 2011, following an intensive and thorough selection process, she was selected by the Conservative Party to be one of the three official candidates to stand at the local elections in May this year. Following election, she has been appointed to serve on three committees of the ERYC:

- the Eastern Area Planning Committee;
- the Police Authority Committee, and,
- the Corporate and Communities Overview and Scrutiny Sub-Committee.

However, she continues to serve as Vice Chair of Roos Parish Council and together with Cllr. Richard Stead and Cllr. Arthur Hodgson the views and opinions of South East Holderness and Roos Parish should be well represented at County Hall.

Introducing Alan Lavender MBE.

Alan Lavender came to live in Roos following his retirement as Head Chef at Chequers, the Prime Ministers Country House in Buckinghamshire.

After training at Croydon College he developed his professional skills in various hotels in London before he joined the RAF. He spent most of his time as a Personal Chef to Royal Air Force Officers, a role which eventually led him to Chequers where he led a team of four chefs and other kitchen staff. This number of chefs was necessary to cope with the many guests that had to be catered for. Although the headlines in the newspapers might identify a couple of key guests, they would be accompanied by all their support staff, ranging in importance from political advisors and secretarial staff to security people and so on. Sometimes this would involve preparing different kinds of meals for up to as many as a hundred people, for the duration of their stay.

His role would extend to cater for the many Charity events held at Chequers. Throughout this period he frequently

represented the UK as a member of 'Club Chefs Des Chef', a world-wide organisation reserved exclusively for Chefs serving Heads of State and Prime Ministers. These annual meetings took him to Canada, China, Greece, France, Switzerland and Mauritius.

During the early 1990's he served as a Celebrity Chef and guest

speaker for Cunard.

More recently, he has worked in education with young people through the British Academy of Culinary Arts in their 'Adopt a School' cookery awareness scheme, and until very recently he was involved in promoting healthy eating and lifestyle through the teaching programme 'Healthy Ambitions' with the, Family Learning Division, of the East Riding of Yorkshire Council.

Occasionally he still dons his whites and chef's hat to cook locally, and of course, to write for the Rooster!

Tea for two with Mrs T

Wimbledon Fortnight, Racing at Royal Ascot and the Test Match at Lords - this usually means that 'rain stopped play'!

But, just in case it is hot and sunny, it is well to be prepared, Alan Lavender writes,

"For this month I thought it would be nice to include a couple of afternoon tea recipes that I would often be asked to prepare and serve during the Thatcher premiership years.

Lady Thatcher was a great fan of "traditional afternoon tea" particularly if the weather enabled it to be served outside on the beautifully manicured lawn, or in the small enclosed "secret garden" she particularly enjoyed using. She loved to maintain the great County House traditions, and whenever possible would take great pains to explain the history of the House to her guests. When she left office, her husband Dennis said, "the only thing he would miss would be times they spent together at Chequers".

Sticky Tea loaf

1/4 pint tea
4 oz sultanas
5 oz castor sugar
4 oz butter
1 teaspoon bicarbonate of soda
6oz sieved plain flour
1 egg
1 teaspoon baking powder

Line a loaf tin with baking paper

Put the first 5 ingredients in a pan and bring to the boil, simmer for 2 minutes and remove from the heat and cool

Add the egg, flour and baking powder and mix well. Place in a tin and bake for about 35 minutes on 160° C. When cool, the cake should be wrapped in foil, to keep it moist.

Eccles cakes

8 oz puff pastry
2oz butter or margarine
2 oz mixed peel
2 oz Demerara sugar
8 oz currants
Pinch of mixed spice

Mix the filling ingredients together

Roll out pastry thinly. Cut out rounds 5 inches in diameter. Damp the edges with water and place a teaspoon of the mixture in the centre of each round

Fold the edges over to the centre and completely seal in the mixture. Brush the top with egg white and dip in castor sugar

Cut 2 incisions with a knife and bake at 200C for about 15 minutes. Serve warm if possible

Roos Parish Council 2007 - 2011

A retrospective review

As a new elected parish council starts a new four year term of office, it is perhaps timely to look back at some of the more eventful and challenging issues that the Council has had to address over the last four years.

Without doubt, the most significant and unexpected challenge came as a result of the heavy and persistent rainfall throughout the area which resulted in severe flooding in June and July 2007. Roos was severely affected. It was the cause of extreme shock and distress for many residents with extensive damage to many properties in the centre of the village. The Taylor Report was commissioned to provide an in-depth analysis of flooding issues. It identified many of its causes and provided the basis for extensive remedial work that been undertaken with the Council working in partnership with residents and the ERYC.

In particular, Roos Beck has been cleared and is regularly inspected for obstructions to maintain its freeflow. Camera inspections have identified problem areas underground.

Additional drainage has been installed, the most recent being remedial work on Rectory Road. Taking everything into account work throughout the village is estimated to

have cost in excess of £300,000, which will help to minimise the risk of another such event re-occurring.

The event highlighted the need for an Emergency Plan to help meet any similar emergency in the future. A group worked together on its development, with the outcome being adopted as a model of good practice by the ERYC. It is currently being reworked in partnership with nearby parishes to include other potential emergency situations.

The decision of the ERYC to refuse planning permission for the Tedder Hill and Roos Windfarms was challenged by the respective developers and became subject to Appeal.

Following two Public Enquiries held by the Planning Inspectorate, both Appeals were upheld. The decisions remain a matter of concern for those who value the rural nature of the parish and south east Holderness.


The four year term started with steady progress being made in implementing the Parish Plan, adopted in 2006 and by the end of 2010 most of its recommendations had been realised. The most significant of which was the realignment of Aldbrough crossroads thereby removing a notorious fatal accident black spot. Other traffic calming measures were introduced throughout the parish. Hodgson Lane, leading to the Medical Practice, has been significantly upgraded. Conservation Areas have been designated in Roos, Tunstall and Hilston.

The evident success and value of the Parish Plan led the Council to commission its revision. The necessary research and consultation is well underway. The outcome may help the Council resolve some issues such as identification of land suitable for allotment use and a reduction in fly tipping. The development of the refreshed Parish Plan is being supported by a financial grant from RES.

Looking ahead, the implications for the parish of the ERYC Local Development Framework and the Localism Bill will soon have to be considered.

Let's hope they do not throw up any unexpected surprises!

A further response was received stating that the currently identified site was unsuitable. It was agreed that a further appeal to landowners to release suitable land to the Council for allotment provision be made through The Rooster.

The Pinfold

It was agreed that improvement works to the pinfold take place during the second week of June and that members liaise with Cllr. Ward to put the work in hand.

Severe winter weather pilot fund

Cllr Cracknell reported that the Parish Sub Group was testing a mini tractor for possible use in the parish. A report would follow.

Flooding and land drainage

Rectory Road

- It was reported that ERYC contractors had now complete land drainage improvements. Further work on the dykes would be carried out together with an inspection of the grips near the Old Rectory.
- It was agreed to enquire of ERYC about grips which had recently been provided.
- It was reported that Mrs Dennis of Cherry Hill Park had been in contact with ERYC in respect of surface water drainage from the estate to the pond on Rectory Road. A reply was awaited.

Tunstall coastal defence scheme

The Environment Agency confirmed that representatives would attend the June meeting to give an update. It was agreed that Rimswell Parish Council be invited to attend the meeting to commence at 7.00pm.

PLANNING MATTERS

Decisions

It was reported that the ERYC had approved the following applications.

- Alteration and extension of former agricultural buildings at Hall Farm Tunstall.
- Erection of outbuilding at The Haven Roston Road Roos .

It was reported that the ERYC had refused the following application.

- Erection of stable/tack room at land south of Rectory Lane Tunstall.

Applications

- Change of use of land to form an extension to existing caravan park at Holderness Country Park, Southfield Lane, Tunstall.

It was agreed to object to the above application on sustainability grounds, coupled with the traffic pressure on Southfield Lane and land drainage issues within the area. Also, the increased development of tourism in that particular area, given the recent planning approval extensions to the Sand le Mere caravan site.

- Erection of two guyed 80m anemometry masts for a period of 24 months at land west of Sunderland Farm, Rectory Road, Roos.

It was agreed to object to the above proposal although Council was advised that the applicant was in the process of supplying additional information to ERYC which the Council would be consulted upon.

- Erection of 67m wind turbine construction of new access road and ancillary development at Carr Farm Tower Road Rimswell.

Cllr. Tyson declared an interest in the application and left the meeting whilst the application was discussed and a decision on any comments to be made to ERYC.

It was agreed to object to the above proposal citing sequential cumulative impact grounds together with the site's close proximity to the coastal zone.

- Erection of single storey garden room extension at Hawthorne Rise, South End, Roos.

Cllrs. Ainley and Ward declared an interest in the application and left the meeting whilst the application was discussed and a decision on any comments to be made.

It was agreed that no objections be made to the proposed development.

- Demolition of single storey building at rear to allow for development at the site at Roos Arms, Main Street, Roos.

Cllr. Cracknell declared an interest in the application and left the meeting whilst the application was discussed and a decision on any comments to be made to ERYC.

It was agreed that no objections be made to the proposed development.

Emergency plan

Cllr. Cracknell confirmed that she would be seeking the help of Alan Bravey of ERYC when a date to hold a further 'table top' exercise had been agreed.

Parish plan

Cllr Ainley reported that Awards for All had refused funding towards its revision, but that other possibilities were being explored.
