There was much to admire in the showing areas, the quality of the exhibits was high, particularly so given the long, cold and wet spring at the start of the growing season. 



The W.I-Inspiring Women


1961 programme shown is an indication that, although some of the subjects listed would now be classed as outdated, the fellowship of this gathering is one which continues today. Looking at the happy group of ladies present at the Birthday Dinner in that year might jog some people's memories.

There is always 'something going on' in the village and the W.I does, wherever possible, like to participate – it is part

of the village! They provided lunch for senior residents at last year's Jubilee Celebrations and the cake stall held at the Roos Show recently was very successful. Membership numbers fluctuate from time to time, as happens in most clubs and societies, but hopefully in 8 years time Roos W.I. will celebrate their centenary and most importantly members will enjoy the meetings, continue the competitive spirit, and, open the doors to new members with a warm welcome.



See the wood for the trees . .



It has been confirmed that the Roos Woodland Group has been awarded up to £14,000 in funding to finance a series of Tree Maintenance Skills courses.

The funding has been made available, under the auspices of Madge Moore, through the East Riding Council Community Learning Fund.

The aim is to train members of the community who form part of the voluntary Roos Woodland Group. The group was formed in 2012 to access funding from wind farm developments in the area in order to establish trees and hedges within the village and surrounding areas. Subsequently the Group was successful in drawing down more than £4,800 in grant awards.

It is a condition of such successful grant awards that a 5 year maintenance

programme is set out and followed, this is to ensure that the plantings become successfully established and maintained. A survey of those who have offered to help and support the maintenance of the trees established that only one had the relevant skills in pesticide and herbicide application being BASIS registered.

The Woodland Group therefore approached Madge Moore, an active member of the group for professional advice. Madge Moore is the Board Director for England of Lantra, a national independent body in the land-based and environmental sector which also develops nationally recognised vocational training courses. She is also a member of the Health and Safety Executives Agricultural Industry Advisory Committee and consequently has the knowledge and experience to recommend suitable training in order to meet the required grant condition.

The outcome is a series of short, practical, vocationally orientated courses which provide certified training in chainsaw and brush cutter operation and the application of appropriate pesticides and herbicides.

This will ensure members operate safely to ensure that risk of accidents is mitigated as much as possible.

It is hoped that such technical training can be extended to other members of the community thereby widening participation in these technical woodland skills.

This may have an added benefit in that these people may be willing to volunteer support and advice to other households within the Roos area.

The training will enable individuals to gain confidence and to apply new skills to benefit others. It may also help an individual gain employment as these certificates are key "tickets" for people working in woodlands and in the landscaping and ground maintenance industries.

The courses which normally cost around £200 per day are free!

- A one day course for 6 people in Brush-cutter maintenance and safe operation with assessment.
- A two day course for 4 people in the safe use of chainsaws and cross cutting with integrated assessment.
- A one day course for 6 people in the Safe Use of pesticides (PA1) and a further day for 6 people in the Safe Use of knapsacks (PA6) followed by assessment to City and Guilds Standards. Both elements of the pesticide training are required to gain the certification.

For the chainsaw and brush-cutter training, one individual may take both training courses to gain the certification.

Places are limited, with applications required to be submitted by mid September.

A message from Canon Cope

In a breathtaking new initiative (I ought to write advertising copy!), York Diocese has changed the way it gets its money. Until this year, an assessment was made as to how much each parish should pay the centre, and it was expected that the parish would cough up what was called by the centre the 'parish share', by most others the 'quota' – and it seemed very much like a tax. Of course the diocese needed the money, because the likes of me are paid by the centre, and someone has to pay my wages (don't they?). Not to mention training costs, government-required admin, legal stuff such as child protection, and all that sort of thing.

But as from next year, that's all going to change. Instead, the diocese is simply going to ask each parish how much they think they can afford, and budget from that. Of course we're expected to be no less generous than we have been in the past, but it's now simply down to us – which is a great risk in faith and trust.

Then again, it's no different to what we as a parish church do to our parishioners – we don't demand a set amount from anyone (apart from wedding, funeral and churchyard fees, of course); we just leave it up to everyone who comes our way to decide how much they put in the plate. Some folk are very generous, some less so, and we get by on what you give us, or try to.

Thought for the month: If the government used the same system for raising taxes, how much would they get? And what would happen then to our health service, for example?

Roos OSCAR NIGHT




ROOS SCHOOL OSCAR NIGHT = HOLLYWOOD STYLE!



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Parish Council Minutes are published in full on Parish Notice Boards and on the parish website – roosparish.info

The following are edited extracts from the July Meeting.

Present: Cllrs. D. Winter (Chairman), W. Ainley, A. Coupe, D. Craggs, A. Dodson, K. Tyson and J. Ward.

Apologies for absence were received from Cllrs. J. Cracknell and R. Smales.

1. Consideration of Councillor's declaration of interests

There were no changes declared by members to the register of interests.

2. Minutes of the meeting held on 10th June 2013

These were agreed as a true record and signed by the Chairman subject to the inclusion relating to grass cutting at Tunstall. Mr Midgley had raised the matter with the Council, following which, it was reported that ERYC would attend to the area in the future.

Matters arising from the minutes

3. Winter weather grant

It was reported that the Council's application for the above grant had now been approved in relation to a new sign at Roos playing field. This would now be erected in the near future.

4. Highway matters

A reply received from the Senior Road Safety Officer of ERYC, stated that as there had been no personal injury collisions outside Roos School no action would be taken with regard to vehicle parking. Further, it was noted that if parking restrictions were to be introduced this would encourage higher speeds past the school as the road would be clear, and that without a constant police presence parking restrictions could not be enforced leading their abuse.

5. Overgrown hedge at Pasture Lane, Tunstall

It was reported that the above overgrown hedge had now been cut back.

6. Freedom of Information request

The Clerk reported that RES UK & Ireland had notified him that the company had no objection to Mrs Blenkin being supplied with a copy of the Roos Wind Farm Community Benefit Fund Agreement

between the Council and the company. A copy had now been forwarded to her.

7. Speeding motorcyclists on Pilmar Lane/Main Street

The Chairman reported that he had met with the complainant who had agreed to supply him with vehicle registration numbers for onward investigation by the Police.

8. RES Roos Wind Farm Community Benefit Fund

It was reported that a meeting had been arranged in the Memorial Institute on the 25th July at 7pm. The purpose was to inform local clubs/organisations of the fund and the potential for submitting schemes to the panel for consideration. It was agreed that copies of a letter of invitation to attend be circulated to relevant parties.

The Council received details of an e-mail from the Chairman of Rimswell Parish Council, which detailed recommendations for the distribution of funds from the three wind farms in the area. The contents of the e-mail were noted.

9. Burning of garden waste

A reply from ERYC Environmental Control confirmed that the individual who had allegedly burnt garden waste, including tyres, had been advised of the relevant legislation in relation to such activity.

10. Planning issue

It was agreed to ask ERYC if the Roos Village Design Statement 2003 had been taken into consideration when determining the planning application for the erection of four dwellings at The Paddocks, South End, Roos as this provides supplementary planning guidance ensuring that future development is in accord with the character of the village both conserving/enhancing the local environment.

Correspondence

11. East Riding Parish News

The latest edition was circulated for members' individual attention.

Planning

12. Application

Erection of double garage and installation of 4 roof lights following demolition of

existing garage at East View, South End, Roos 13/01836/PLF

It was agreed that no objections be made to the proposed development.

13. Decisions

Retention of general purpose agricultural buildings at Westhill Farm, Main Street, Tunstall - buildings A and B

Conversion of an outbuilding to form additional living accommodation, increase in roof height to part of existing garage, removal of window to southern elevation replacement of 2 no. windows to rear elevation, replacement door to front and installation of roof light to rear at Manor Farm, Main Street, Tunstall.

It was reported that ERYC had approved the above three applications.

14. Treasurer's report

The Treasurer sought and received approval for payment of the following accounts:-

Memorial Institute - hire of hall - £45.00

Avondale Landscapes - work on footpaths 5, 8 and 17 - £105.00

Roos Playing Field Association - payment from ERYC for new sign - £158.00

B Lee - salary/expenses for three months - £843.75

Any other business

15. Snaith Trust

Cllr. Coupe reported that, as Canon Cope had indicated that he would be moving on in the near future, he did not wish to be involved in the future administration of the trust. It was recommended that the Council's representatives discuss the matter with the Churchwardens of Tunstall.

16. Road sign at North End/Pinfold Lane

It was agreed to refer overgrown foliage from a tree obscuring the sign to the ERYC for attention.

17. Tedder Hill Wind Farm

It was agreed to request ERYC for an update on the constitution of the proposed Community Benefit Fund panel and the funding opportunities from the fund, particularly as the turbines are now in situ and expected to be commissioned in the near future.

Parishmatters

18. Proposed skate park at Roos School

Cllr. Coupe informed the meeting that ERYC was considering the provision of a skate park in the school playground in the near future.

19. Roos Beck

The Chairman confirmed that ERYC's contractor had installed a new grille at Lamb Lane, and, that one would also shortly be installed at Dove Lane.

20. Tunstall Coastal Defence Scheme

It was agreed to ask ERYC for an update on any developments since the last briefing meeting.

Next meeting

The next meeting is the Parish Open Meeting to be held on 9th September 2013 commencing at 7.00pm, this will be followed by the normal Council meeting.

The Missing Link *Another step along the way?*

Following an objection to the ERYC proposal to add Roos Footpath No 18 and Burton Pidsea Footpath No 8 to the Definitive Map and Statement, the matter was passed to the Secretary of State for a decision. The Planning Inspectorate has recently announced its timetable for submission of evidential material by the interested parties. The review will take the form of an exchange of statements of case and comments and will include a site visit by the Inspector. The deadline for submission of material is the 19th November 2013.

The outcome of the review and a decision is likely to be announced in early 2014 almost four years since local walkers and the parish council initiated the proposed modifications to the Definitive Map and Statement.
