

'FREE' – at last!

The Roos Arms becomes a 'Free House'.



There is little doubt that brewery companies and their licensees are experiencing difficult times. Nationally, around five public houses close down each week. There are many reasons for this, not least, increasing running costs and high

government taxation on alcoholic beverages. Additionally, the leisure and recreational life styles of their customers are changing, particularly in the current economic climate. The Roos Arms has been subject to similar pressures and until comparatively recently was facing an uncertain future. If the Roos Arms had become one of those five weekly closures, then the consequences for village life and the appearance of the village would have been considerable. The Roos Arms is a significant building contributing much to the character and identity of the centre of the village. Roos, without both its 'bottom' (Black Horse) and 'top' pub (The Roos Arms) would be unthinkable.

However, there is cause for optimism. With the Roos Arms passing into private and local ownership, the constraints of being a 'tied house' have been removed. Already, many will have noticed the speed at which Armin Hüppler's Company has started redevelopment. Most immediately obvious is the replacement of its traditional suspended pub sign and other general signage. The exterior has been repainted in a warmer welcoming colour.

When this is considered alongside similar work undertaken to shops elsewhere in Main

Street, the village centre is becoming increasingly attractive in appearance for residents and visitors alike.

Some internal refurbishment and redecoration has already begun but more radical changes are promised. Plans are being prepared, which, when approved and implemented, will significantly enhance the pub's facilities to meet current professional standards and customers' expectations. All this will take time and it may well be into next year before the full extent of the redevelopment programme becomes apparent. Meanwhile customer choice has been widened through the introduction of an enhanced range of beers

If the example of the development of the Station Hotel in Patrington, is anything to go by, the future of the Roos Arms, in the same private ownership, looks assured.

***Cookery Corner* by Ann Coupe**

Bacon and Mushroom Pizza

Ingredients:

Base:-

75g (3oz) plain flour
3 teaspoons (3 x 5ml) baking powder
75g (3oz) wholewheat flour
40g (1 1/2oz) unsalted butter
100ml (4 fl oz) milk.

Topping:-

1 small onion finely chopped
1 x 425g (15oz) tin chopped tomatoes
drained
½ teaspoon oregano
Salt and pepper
125g (4oz) button mushrooms, sliced
175g (6oz) Edam cheese, grated
50g (2oz) bacon, cut into strips

Method:

1. Sieve the plain flour and baking powder together in a bowl and stir in the wholewheat flour. Rub in the butter until the mixture resembles fine breadcrumbs.
2. Mix to a soft dough with the milk. Knead lightly.
3. Roll out to a round approximately 20cm (8") in diameter and lift onto a greased baking sheet.
4. Mix together the onion, drained tomatoes, herbs and seasoning.
5. Cover the base of the pizza with mushrooms, reserve a few for decoration. Sprinkle over half of the grated cheese. Spread over the tomato mixture and arrange reserved mushrooms and bacon strips decoratively on top. Sprinkle with remaining cheese.
6. Bake 230°C (450°F), Fan 210°C, Gas mark 8 for 20 minutes, then reduce oven temperature to 200°C (400°F), Fan 180°, Gas mark 6, for a further 10 minutes.

Serve hot or cold with a salad. **Serves: 4 - 6**

REPAIR AND REUSE REGISTER

East Riding of Yorkshire Council is extending its repair and reuse register to include a directory of home traders such as plumbers.

The register already lists companies in the East Riding that repair household goods like TVs, fridges, irons, furniture and clothing. It also lists charities and organisations that accept unwanted home goods, including beds and wardrobes, that can be passed to those in need, like the homeless.

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Community

Alec's Patch ... By Alec Dodson

This month it is a good time to take stock particularly of herbaceous and other border plants. Changes in position or removal and replacement with other varieties will be beneficial for next season. Make notes now for improvements later.

Vegetables and fruit should also receive a critical eye. Many gardeners keep growing out dated varieties and in the case of fruit worn out specimens when new improved strains are available.

Trees, Shrubs and Climbers

Buddleias, Deutzias, Philadelphus and many evergreens will root easily during August. Cuttings around 4" long with lower leaves removed should be taken, inserted in a sandy compost and placed in a cold frame or other sheltered position. Make sure the cuttings don't dry out.

Potatoes

Due to the wet weather, Blight (brown patches) is prevalent at the moment. Once seen it is usually too late. Remove the tops and dispose of them. Do not put them on the compost heap as the spores can exist over winter. Bordeaux mixture is the control, but needs to be applied in advance.

Garden Tools

Autumn and the time for digging will soon be upon us.

A set of good and reliable tools is essential if gardening is to be enjoyed. Tools that are too heavy or extremely cumbersome, or tend to break or bend, do nothing to increase the pleasure of gardening.

If possible select tools to suit your build and height. A spade that is too short, for instance, will soon cause backache. Similarly, a large spade or fork for a small person will also put strain on back muscles.

Stainless-steel tools do not only look attractive, they also have an advantage in that the soil usually falls off them easily and cleaning is no problem, and of course, they do not rust. However, they are expensive. Good quality steel tools are available, and as long as they are thoroughly cleaned and oiled after use they will give many years of good service.

The maintenance of tools is important. The best way to clean dirty tools is to immerse them in a bucket of water or to hold them under a jet of water and scrub with a stiff brush. Once the soil has been removed, dry them thoroughly and wipe the metal parts with an oily rag. Stainless steel tools, will not require oiling, but they still need to be washed and dried.

Gardening tools are best stored in a dry and airy shed, if possible hung from a beam. Tools with wooden handles can be smeared with linseed oil at the end of the season, but plastic-covered handles only require a wipe with a dry cloth.

BLUE BIN REMINDER

Did you know that plastic shampoo, milk and washing-up liquid bottles should go into the blue bin at your door.

East Riding of Yorkshire Council has issued a reminder about what can be recycled in the blue bins, as well as paper.

Turn over bottle-shaped plastic containers and they should have the number 1, 2 or 3 in a triangle on the bottom - this identifies the grade or type of plastic. These should all go in the blue bin.

As for yogurt and margarine cartons, they are generally made from such poor-grade plastics that there is little demand for recycling them. For now, you will have to steel yourself to put them in the green bin or use them for storing foods for your freezer.

During the 12 months up to April 2009, the council's blue bin scheme has collected and recycled 15,000 tonnes of paper, plastic bottles and cans.

Roos Parish Council Meeting 10th August 2009

Seven members were present.

Apologies from Councillor J Ward

The July minutes were approved. Extracts below.

Proposed allotments in Roos

As Councillor Ward was not present it was agreed that the matter be dealt with at the next meeting.

Safe routes to school programme

The Clerk reported that he had been unable to contact Mr Lockwood on any progress he had made in his discussions with the other joint developer Mr Hurd in relation to highway and footpath improvements in Greenacre Park and it was agreed to refer the matter to the Area Engineer of ERYC for attention.

Hodgson Lane

The Chairman reported that he would be pursuing ERYC on lack of progress with the proposed improvement works and raising the matter again with Graham Stuart MP and the Clerk confirmed that he would approach ERYC Councillor Grove.

Guide to facilities within the parish

It was agreed to proceed with an initial print of 50 mono copies of the information leaflet kindly produced by Mr Ainley for which the Chairman thanked him on behalf of the Council.

Parish paths

Councillor Dodson reported that the path on the boundary with Burton Pidsea was not blocked or causing access problems.

Highway matters

The Clerk reported receipt of a reply from the Area Engineer of ERYC which stated that Mr Makey was not prepared to dedicate land to allow ERYC to set back the hedge at the junction of Quaker Road and the B1242 and that a scheme to buy land and set back the hedge had been forwarded for possible inclusion in next year's capital programme.

As the existing No Through Road sign on South End near Lamb Lane is a short distance from the junction and is clearly visible, the Area Engineer saw little benefit in moving it but would look at providing an additional direction sign for Halsham/Aldbrough at the junction of Lamb Lane and Rectory Road.

The Area Engineer confirmed that the potholes near Tunstall Church would be repaired.

Flooding and related matters

The Chairman reported that the debris in the ditch alongside The Old Rectory in Rectory Road had now been removed by the riparian owner and it was agreed to ask ERYC to re-camera the beck under Becksid Manor following recent removal of the root mass as concern was expressed that there could still be a drainage problem in that particular area.

The Chairman also reported that a site meeting with the Environmental Section of ERYC was to take place to discuss sewerage entering the beck requiring attention. The Clerk reported receipt of a reply from the Area Engineer of ERYC confirming that he would contact ERYC Ground Maintenance for costings for the removal of the bushes and overgrown vegetation with a view to carrying out the works after the bird-nesting season.

Correspondence

Tunstall Church

A letter from Tunstall Parochial Church Council was received requesting financial assistance towards the cost of roof repairs to the church.

Councillor Cracknell declared an interest and took no part in the discussion or voted in the matter and it was agreed on the Chairman's casting vote that a contribution of £200.00 be made.

Rimswell Parish Council

The Clerk read an e-mail received from the Chairman of the above Council seeking the Council's support to a letter which was intended to be placed before ERYC Planning Committee on the 30th July in connection with proposed renewable energy sites and it was agreed that Rimswell Parish Council be informed that the Council fully support the contents of the proposed communication to ERYC.

Planning

Decisions

Erection of two-storey extension to rear following demolition of existing conservatory at Cornelian, South end, Roos

It was reported that ERYC had approved the above application.

Application

Erection of 3 no wind turbines, substation access and associated development at land south of Hogsea Lane, Hilston for Energiekontor UK.

It was agreed in line with Council policy to object to the above proposal as was the case on the previous application for a wind farm on the site.

Treasurer's report

The Treasurer was given approval for payment of the following accounts:-

Memorial Institute - hire of hall	£22.50
Avondale Landscapes - maintenance of parish paths	£135.00
B Lee - Clerk's salary for three months	£675.00

The Treasurer also reported that the Audit Commission had approved the accounts for 2008/09.

Any other business

Bottle bank at Roos Arms

Discussion took place on the removal of the bottle bank and the Clerk reported receipt

of an e-mail from ERYC which stated an alternative site at the Black Horse was unsuitable because of its inadequate access and poor car park surface.

Parish paths maps

Councillor Craggs requested a further supply of 20 maps and it was agreed to arrange for a print of 50 extra copies to meet future demand.

Dog fouling

Concern was expressed at dog fouling in Roos and it was agreed to refer the matter to the dog warden at ERYC.

Proposed microphone system

It was agreed to investigate the possible provision of such a system for audio improvement in the Memorial Institute during the meeting..

Public session

Mrs Blenkin raised several issues in relation to the planning application due to be heard by ERYC Planning Committee later in the month for the proposed Roos Wind Farm in particular that no Cumulative Impact Assessment had been undertaken and concerns over run off water from the site and it was agreed that these issues be relayed to ERYC.


